The Course Objectives and Outcomes:

The main objective of this course is to provide students with an opportunity to appreciate and learn both history and the current state of theatre, music, and art in London. London has been one of the important centers of arts and culture. Through studying and experiencing the cultures and arts in London, students will be able to examine and articulate cultural diversity within London and differences between their own cultural/artistic knowledge and experiences and those in London. Our goals include studying history of theatre, art, and music and other forms of art by researching and visiting key historical and cultural attractions.

The Theme:

Through studying various art forms developed in London, we will be considering the birth and development of various arts, including theatre, paintings, sculptures, other visual arts, fashion, and music. While our focus will be examining history and conditions of arts in London and beyond, we will consider two over-arching concerns of contemporary London: "Empire" and "Multi." London was the center of the nineteenth century British Empire with the central key issues of class and war "Multi" is a modifier that is used to describe the diversity of London today: multi-ethnic, multi-linguist, multi-cultural, etc. The course will provide a variety of views on these issues before we get to experience London as a historical, artistic, and multicultural city.
