THEA 41095 SPECIAL TOPICS COURSE: NEW YORK CITY THEATRE EXPERIENCE SPRING 2012

OBJECTIVES

The class is geared for students who have not experienced New York and want to explore the options of the city as a permanent home and a cultural Mecca. Class trip will follow as structured itinerary, some of which will be planned during the course with the input from students who will have the opportunity to create activities through research and investigation prior to the trip. The four- day trip is tentatively scheduled to depart Kent on Friday morning, March 16 and return evening of Monday, March 19, 2012.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This special topic course is designed to provide students with the opportunity to visit the world-renowned New York theatre community to gain information and insight of history, culture, and arts of the city. We will study the dynamics of New York City's performing arts (theatre, film, music, dance); and visual arts (painting, sculpture, photographs, multimedia installation, and other types of exhibitions). A four day trip to New York will focus on attending theatre performances, post-show discussions, pre-arranged workshops, cultural tours, and visiting museums and industry related venues. Portions of the lectures and discussions prior to the trip will be conducted via **BLACKBOARD**.

Itinerary is subject to change and will be determined by available resources, current productions, and both permanent collections and special exhibitions.

STUDENT COSTS:

Students are required to make a payment of \$ 350.00 in advance to the School of Theatre and Dance by January 20, 2012. This non-refundable fee is in addition to the regular tuition.

The fee would cover 3 night accommodations in New York (shared room- occupancy, approximately \$50-80 per night) and entrance fees into all required exhibits and activities. Meals, local ground transportation and optional performance tickets are not covered. In addition, you are responsible for purchasing a flight from Akron/Canton-New York (currently approximately \$250) and return transportation. This purchase will be done in class.

Please note that each student is responsible for purchasing theatre tickets of his/her choice (with the instructors' approval) either on site or in advance.

We will be having many open-discussions about New York and your thoughts and ideas regarding planning are crucial to the rest of the class. work together. (Note – you cannot receive these points if you are absent, sleeping, talking, texting, doing homework for another class or reading a newspaper).
